

U. S. Raid On Jap I Be Dramatized On

March Of Time Will Reenact Daring
Friday Night; Berlin Numbers
Concert Program

March of Time Friday will re-enact the task force of the U. S. Pacific fleet on Jalapert and Marshall Islands, an offensive described as "a blueprint for victory." "Tide of Action" and based on experiences of Life correspondent Bert Landry, who photographed the attack, returned to New York with a first-hand report. It will be aired over WJZ at 9:30 p. m.

Going "on scene" in the distant Pacific with an exciting dramatization of life aboard an American destroyer steaming into battle with the enemy, March of Time will give listeners a vivid understanding of the type of offensive action the United States must undertake on a grand scale, to win the war.

Selections from Irving Berlin's "Louisiana Purchase" will be featured on the concert under Dr. Frank Black's baton, Friday, at 8:00 p. m. over WEAJ.

Lucille Manners' soprano solos are "Senora" by Nathan and "Beautiful Lady" from Cayll's "Pink Lady"; Ross Graham sings "Hills of Home" by Fox; the orchestra plays Kreisler's "Tambourin Chinois," and the ensemble rounds out the show with "For No Rhyme or Reason" by Cole Porter.
