

Story Of Last Brazilian Emperor To Be Broadcast

Music And Narrative Recital Concerning Dom Pedro Braganza Scheduled At 10 P. M. Monday Over WEAF

The story of Dom Pedro Braganza, last emperor of Brazil, will be told in music and narrative at 10 p. m. Monday over WEAF. The story of the Braganza family began in Portugal, just as it ended there with the death of Dom Pedro, last of the line. They left their country in 1808, fleeing Napoleon, and settled in Brazil to become the democratic, beloved rulers of that South American country. For a time, in fact, the entire Portuguese empire was ruled from their palace in Rio de Janeiro.

A good-neighborly salute to Francisco Mignone, celebrated Brazilian composer now touring the U. S. as "musical ambassador," will be the highlight of the "Telephone Hour" Monday at 8 p. m. The orchestra under Donald Voorhees is to play "Congada," one of Mignone's most successful works.

Richard Crooks, tenor star of "Voice of Firestone," features two opera airs Monday, March 23. He sings "Una Furtiva Lagrime" from Donizetti's "Elixir of Love" and "Then You'll Remember Me" from "The Bohemian Girl" by Balfe at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF.

The orchestra, under Alfred Wallenstein, plays "Ballet Egyptian" by Lullini, Schubert's "Moment Musical," and Lecuona's "Malaguena." Crooks rounds out the concert with "Green Hills of Ireland" by del Riego and O'Hara's "Little Mother of Mine."

THREE DAMAGE ACTIONS FILED AGAINST CITY

ST. MARYS, March 23—Three more damage suits for the sum of \$18,500 have been brought against the city of St. Marys by Noble-ty citizens who claim their land has been damaged to that extent because of the city's emptying sewage into the St. Marys river traversing their land.

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Ryan have asked \$6,000 damages, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Craft \$7,500 and Mr. and Mrs. James Hebble, \$5,000.

Previously a suit for \$10,000 damages was brought by Justus Hoverman, near Kossuth, against St. Marys for a similar reason.

16 SCHOOLS TO ENTER DEBATE MEET, CONGRESS

BOWLING GREEN, March 23—Students from 16 high schools will "take over" Bowling Green State university during spring vacation, April 2 to 4.

About 100 will participate in a debate tournament and a similar number in a student congress. Both events are sponsored by the western Ohio and southern Michigan district of the National Forensic League.

Outstanding students in public speaking and social science will be drawn together into their second annual mock bicameral student congress. Each school may enter two senators and one member of the house, with an additional house member of each 10 forensic league votes.

The "legislators" will draft their own bills, back them up with facts and arguments, meet in committee and seek legislative solutions. Members will be graded on their speeches on the floor.
