U. S., Latin America Trade Salutes on Air Tonight

Two cities and two Americas will unite in the presentation of a Pan-American musical program for the Music Educators National conference over WIBA at 8:30 tonight. The United States will be represented by Milwaukee, where the music educators will be holding their 27th biennial conference, and South America by Rio de Janeiro.

Villa-Lobos, foremost South American composer, will speak from Brazil, greeting the United States and the conference. Charles Seeger, chief of the music division of the Pan-American union, will introduce important guests from South America and his greeting will be answered by Domingo Sante Cruz, dean of the department of fine arts, University of Santiago.

Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio high school students will present the musical portion of the broadcast. William Berrian, assistant director of humanities, Rockefeller foundation, will present the program in English, Spanish and Portuguese.

Prominent guests who will be introduced during the broadcast include Filomena Sales, secretary of the department of fine arts, University of Santiago, Chile; Francisco Mignone, professor of conducting in the National School of Music, and Mrs. Mignone, of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Dr. Esther N. de Calvo, of Panama; Juan Battiste Plaza, of Caracas, Venezuela; Jose Castenada of Guatemala, secretary de la Presidencia and Antonio Sa Pereira, director of the National School of Music, Rio de Janeiro.
