## LEW AYRES WAR OBJECTO

Film Star Surprises Hollywoo By Departure For Camp In Oregon

HOLLYWOOD, April 1 (INS)-Departure of Film St Lew Ayres to a camp for conse entious objectors in Oregon struc Hollywood like a bombshell toda On every studio lot, in ever swank night club and wherevo screen notables gather, the actor refusal to fight for his countr was the No. 1 topic of conversa tion.
Ayres, who hecame famous years ago as the soldier hero the memorable "All Quiet on th Western Front," flagged a South em Pacific train in the suburbs $t$ start his journey to the objectors camp at Cascade Locks, Ore.
Intimates of the 33 -year-old ac tor expressed surprise at his ac tion. Ayres passed his Army phys cal examination Jan. 19 with fly ing colors.
At the time it was believed that he would enter some branch of the service. It was not until las night, shortly before Ayres was to leave for the Oregon camp, that is was learned that he had been classified as a conscientious objector on religious grounds.
Ever Ayres' studio was stumned by the actor's departure. Studio publicity men stated that it had been understood that Ayres planned to enter "some form of military service soon."

There were many in Hollywood who believed that the actor's refusal to shoulder a gun had written an abrupt finis to his film career. Some attributed his decision to the deep impression made upon him by the role he enacted in the "All Quiet" movic.
He told his draft board that war was abhorrent to him and that he could not conscientiously bear arms.
A. II. Peir, head of Ayres' draft board, described the actor as "nuite a philosopher," and said that on the basis of Ayres' description of his personal beliefs the draft board had no other alternative than to classify him as a conscientious objector.
"lle was not a Quiter
he was not a Quaker or member of any other celigious organization," said Peir, "but he did "He a kind of religion of his own. "He told us he didn't believe in war or in killing, and furnished ample evidence to show us he was
