Great Lakes Naval Training Station Men Scheduled For Variety Show Via WJZ

"The A.E.F. in Australia" will be the subject of the "March of Time" dramatization on Friday, over WJZ at 9:30 p. m. LONGEVITY PAY IS VETOED FOR POSTAL WORKER

WASHINGTON, April 3 — (INS) — President Roosevelt yesterday vetoed a bill which would have established a system of longevity pay for 222,500 field employes of the postal service.

The President advised the house of representatives that all employes affected already are covered by the pay scales of the classification act of 1923, and should the bill become law a discrimination would result as against other employes.

Further, the President said the bill was not a temporary measure for increased compensation because of any rise in living costs, but provided instead permanent increases which would cost the government about \$14,000,000 the first year and \$39,000,000 ultimately.

HILLMAN SAYS NYA IS NEEDED IN WAR EFFORT

WASHINGTON, April 3 — (INS) — Reporting that war industries now employed more than 7,500,000 workers, Sidney Hillman, labor director of the war production board, told the senate labor committee that the National Youth Administration was a "desirable part of our over-all industrial manpower program."
