

War from Camps, War in Program for WIBA Today

To Americans at home, to the United Nations, and to U. S. troops abroad, the war department will speak its official mind during the third weekly broadcast of the Army hour over WIBA at 2:30 p. m. today.

From Camp Edwards, Mass., Bill Stern, sports commentator, will take the air with a private or two for an on-the-spot picture of the 50-calibre anti-tank machine gun in action.

From points overseas the voices of American soldiers on active battlefronts are to be heard. Last week's short-wave pickups brought listeners the talk of tanned and toughened American men on the alert in the Panama Canal Zone. Details of this week's overseas pickups cannot be revealed in advance of the moment of broadcast.

To American boys in Australia, Ireland, Iceland, wherever they are, the War Department-sponsored program will take, by short-wave, something they used to hear back home: from Wrigley Field, Chicago, will come a portion of the third game of the opening series of the Chicago Cubs vs. the Cincinnati Reds. From NBC's Chicago studios, Kay Kyser and his band will air some tunes to quicken memories of the States.

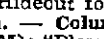

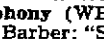

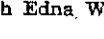
