

Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish religious leaders will combine during a half-hour appeal for a national war tithe over WIBA at 4 p. m. today.

Supporting the treasury department in its drive to absorb at least 10 per cent of everyone's income for the war fund, the speakers include the Rt. Rev. James E. Freeman, Episcopal bishop of Cathedral Close, Mt. St. Alban, Washington, D. C.; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, general secretary of the National Catholic Welfare conference; Rabbi Norman Gerstenfeld, Washington Hebrew congregation, and chairman of the Committee on Religious Life in the nation's capitol, and the Rev. 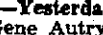
