

# Jane Withers To Be Guest Of Charlie Sunday Evening

Jim Braddock And Joe Louis Will Be Interviewed By Editor Of Sporting News During Show At 2:30 p. m.

Charley McCarthy is tired of dating glamor girls—for the time being, at any rate. To vary things a bit, therefore, he decided to date a sub-deb for a change and invited Jane Withers to take part at 8 p. m. over WEAJ.

The world's heavyweight boxing champion and the man he defeated to win his title will be heard on "The Show of Yesterday and Today" Sunday, at 2:30 p. m. on Pvt. Joe Louis and Jim Braddock, and Lt. Col. Neil O'Brien, who inducted Louis into the Army, will be interviewed from New York by Art Flynn, editor of Sporting News.

The musical portion of the show, featuring Blue Barron's orchestra with Clyde Burke, Jimmy Brown, Billy Cover, Charlie Fisher, the Three Blue Notes and Henry Clark (as Nick Democracy), will air from New Haven, where Barron's troupe is playing an engagement. Alton Alexander produces the series, formerly a U. S. Division of Physical Fitness feature, now expanded to represent the entire Federal Security Agency.

Andre Kostelanetz offers contrast in music on "The Pause That Refreshes" over WABC Sunday, at 4:30 p. m., when he conducts the orchestra in "Moonlight Cocktail," "Two Hearts in Three-Quarter Time" and "The Young Prince and Young Prin-

cess" from Rimsky-Korsakov's "Scheherazade." Soprano Nadine Connor is guest singer, Albert Spalding, violinist, is master of ceremonies.

"We, the People" will take its listeners via radio on an actual target drive in a U. S. Army bomber as the highlight of its broadcast Sunday, at 7:30 p. m. on WABC. The "Army Air Force" will be the theme of the program whose guests will include Major Frank G. Lahm, first U. S. Army pilot, and Colonel Eddie Rickenbacker, World War I ace.

Third of six service men who are to appear as soloists on the "Hour of Charm" program is W. Dudley Lutten, seaman second class of the United States Navy. Lutten, who is an instructor at the machinist mate's school at Jacksonville Naval Air Station at Opa Locka, Fla., will sing with the all-girl orchestra, Phil Spitalny conducting, Sunday, at 10:00 p. m. over WEAJ.

The Silver Masked Tenor, famed for years as the star of a fine program and one of radio's real veterans, returns to the microphone Sunday over a group of stations. In the early days of radio he was the best known male singer in the land. Still wearing his silver mask and cloaking his identity as always, he will appear as guest star on "Those Good Old Days" along with Ethel Gilbert, singing soubrette; Lulu Bates, ragtime shouter; Hal Willard, romantic baritone; the male quartet end Em Cee Patrick Henry Barnes, junior, all from Bill's Gay Nineties Restaurant in New York City.
