Brig. Gen. James H. Doolittle, who led an American air raid on Tokyo and other Japanese cities, will speak during the Army hour over WIBA at 2:30 p. m. today. The program also will include a pickup from West Point, with a review of the cadets, an address by Maj. Gen. F. E. Wilby, superintendent, and music by the academy band; a pickup from the Atlantic seaboard, with Bill Stern describing an aerial weapon; premiere of "Bombardier Song," a Rodgers and Hart song, and an address by Mrs. William C.
