

# Allan Jones, Irene Hervey Set For Ontario Show Hour

Pair Of Film Favorites Will Be Heard With Stoopnagle At 7 P. M. Friday; Whiting Tunes Will Be Featured

Two film favorites, Allan Jones and his wife, Irene Hervey, will share the guest star spotlight on the Ontario Show, Friday at 7 p. m. over WJZ. The musical variety broadcast is sponsored by the Province of Ontario to further good will between the United States and Canada.

Colonel Lemuel Q. Stoopnagle, he of the droll wit, will charge the air with his quips while the vocalizing end of the program will be carried by Nancy Douglas, Dave Davies, Georgia Day and Albert Whitehead's chorus of 16 voices. Luigi Romanelli and his orchestra will provide the music, with Herb May announcing.

The top tunes of Richard Whiting, for the past 20 years a consistent turner-out of song hits, will be recalled Friday at 8 p. m. over WEA. The medley, comprising "Aint We Got Fun?", "Louise," "Horses," "Till We

Meet Again" and "Tin Pan Parade," is to feature Lucille Manners, Ross Graham, and the chorus and orchestra under Dr. Frank Black's baton.

Melvyn Douglas, noted screen star, and William A. Irvin, former president of U. S. Steel and chairman of the War Production Fund to Conserve Manpower, will appear as guests on the opening broadcast of "Men, Machines—Victory," accident-prevention series to be heard Fridays at 10:15 p. m. over WJZ beginning June 5.

Presented in cooperation with the National Safety Council as part of a nation-wide drive to conserve vitally needed manpower for the nation's all-out production effort, Douglas will be heard as narrator on the initial broadcast, subtitled, "Man with a Punch."

Eddie Cantor, her Wednesday night radio boss on "Time to Smile," will be Dinah Shore's guest on her own program over WJZ at 9:30 p. m. They'll do a duet of the new novelty tune, "Jingle, Jangle, Jingle." Another feature will be Dinah's introduction in this country of a new English hit, "He Wears Silver Wings," a heart-tugging tune about the R.A.F. which the singer dedicates to the boys in the service. Other numbers are "Sam the Accordion Man," "All I Need is You" and "Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree."
