# Senate Holds to Its Stand on Parity

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — The senate awaited a move from the house today after reaffirming its stand endorsing sub-parity sales of surplus grain stocks.

Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), chairman of the senate conferees attempting to adjust conflicting versions of the agriculture supply bill, reported Thursday that the house conferees had declined to accept any compromise on the controversial amendment. The senate then voted 46 to 13 to maintain its position approving sub-parity sales.

The senate version of the bill would allow the Commodity Credit Corp. to sell its surplus grain stocks and 125,000,000 bushels of surplus wheat for feed at 85 per cent of the parity price.

Russell said house conferees insisted that no grain should be sold at sub-parity prices unless it has deteriorated.

Senate and administration leaders have wanted authority to dispose of the stocks—particularly wheat—to feed this year's cattle crop.

The senate also adopted Thursday, by a vote of 52 to 7, a motion to insist on a \$40,000,000 item for the Farm Security administration. This sum would be al-
