

Francis X. Bushman Will Have Role In Radio Drama

Matinee Idol Of Silent Movie Days Set In Part Of John Marshall In "Those We Love" Due Wednesday

With most members of the original cast in the roles they created, "Those We Love," the dramatic story of the Marshall family of New England, will return to the air Wednesday, over the Red Network at 9 p. m. "Those We Love" replaces the Eddie Cantor program while the comedian takes his usual summer vacation.

Newcomers to the cast are Francis X. Bushman, veteran of the silent screen, who will assume the role of John Marshall, and Anne Stone, to be heard as Lydia Dennison, a nurse. Leading players in the new series who have been on the program since it made its radio bow in January 1939 are Nan Grey, Richard Cromwell, Donald Woods, Helen Wood, Ann Todd, Mary Gordon, Alma Kruger, and Virginia Sale.

The unusual antics of a young psychoanalyst's wife, whose behavior defied the rules of modern psychology, will form the plot for "The Man With the Adorable Wife," the dramatization to be presented during "Manhattan at Midnight" Wednesday at 8:30 p. m. over WJZ.

Starring George Lambert and Dorothy Duckworth, the play, written by Joe Bates Smith, will present the startling case of a naive southern belle thrust into Gotham's brilliantly brittle social life, and forced to mix with her husband's glittering friends who demand an epigram, as well as an olive, with each Martini.

Jess Walters, who leaped from the obscurity of vaudeville to a place as the most important singing find of the year, will be a guest of "Great Moments in

Music" over WABC Wednesday at 10 p. m. He will sing the baritone role in selections from Sigmund Romberg's "The Student Prince."

Nelson Eddy will sing the national anthem, as only he can sing it, during his broadcast Wednesday at 8 p. m. over CBS.

Paying tribute to that grand old trouper and composer of hit songs, George M. Cohan, Eddy will sing "Grand Old Flag." He also will sing "Cargoes," the John Masefield poem, set to music by Dobson; "Back to Donegal," an Irish novelty by Steve Graham, and an aria from Rubinstein's "The Demon."
