

Alexander Bloch Makes Debut in Summer Symphony Tonight

Alexander Bloch, conductor of the Central Florida symphony orchestra, will make his debut with the Summer Symphony at 8 tonight over WIBA.

Bloch will open with Samuel Barber's "Adagio for Strings," which was given its world premiere by the same orchestra under the baton of Arturo Toscanini.

The second selection will be Haydn's Symphony in G Major, No. 88, one of 12 symphonies Haydn composed for presentation in Paris. For the third and final selection, Bloch will play one of the most popular tone poems by Franz Liszt, "Les Preludes."
