

Sensational New Symphony To Be Heard First Sunday

Soviet Repulse Of Nazi Hordes At Leningrad Inspired Piece; "Victory Parade" Plans Dramatic Broadcast

Rushed safely to the United States by airplane and motor car thru enemy battlefronts, Dmitri Shostakovich's sensational Seventh Symphony—the latest and, perhaps, greatest work of Russia's brilliant young composer, written under the flame and fire of the Nazi attack on Leningrad—will be given its first Western Hemisphere performance Sunday, at 4:15 to 6:00 p. m., over WEAF by the Symphony Orchestra under the baton of maestro Arturo Toscanini.

The patriotic radio feature "Victory Parade," presented by NBC in cooperation with the government, will feature a "Mr. District Attorney" cast and script on Sunday at 6:30 p. m. over WEAF.

The Army doctor, the man on whose knowledge and deft hands many lives depend when the attack is on, will be the featured soldier in the War Department's official "Army Hour" broadcast Sunday at 3:30 p. m. over WEAF.

The doctor's training and his work under field conditions will be explained and demonstrated at the Medical Field Service School, Carlisle Barracks, Penn., during a simulated attack. The school is one of the principal training centers where the doctor's peacetime skill is adapted to wartime conditions.

"Garden of Death," the gruesome story of unholy machinations in a flower bed, will be dramatized during the "Inner Sanctum" mystery show Sunday at 8:30 p. m., over WJZ. The plot will center about a mad botanist-scientist engaged in the art of transforming sweet smelling roses into horrible monsters which devour little children and old ladies.

After a brief vacation Gladys Swarthout, popular mezzo-soprano, returns to the air as the star of "The Family Hour" on Sunday at 5:00 p. m. over WEAF and will be heard with the noted critic and commentator, Deems Taylor, and Al Goodman's orchestra and chorus.

INDICTMENT OF MICHIGAN MAN IS DISMISSED

DETROIT, July 18—(UP)—Federal Judge Shackelford Miller, Jr., of Louisville, Ky., today dismissed an indictment accusing Frank D. McKay, Republican national committeeman for Michigan, of using the mails to defraud Edsel Ford of \$9,918 in campaign contributions.

The court ruled, however, that the multi-millionaire Grand Rapids political leader should stand trial on three counts of another indictment accusing him of using the mails in a conspiracy with Stanahan, Harris and Co., a Toledo, O., investment firm, to rig bids on a \$2,255,000 Grand Rapids waterworks pipeline to Lake Michigan.

Ordered to stand trial with McKay were Robert P. Mikesell, vice president of Stanahan, Harris and Co., and Stewart P. Blaiser, Detroit, the firm's Michigan representative.

McKay, the indictment charges, used his political influence to induce the city of Grand Rapids to sell bonds for the pipeline to the Toledo company regardless of other bids. It alleges the plan was to advertise the bids privately under the pretention that they were being offered for public bidding.
