

# Guest Hobbyists Inaugurate New "Hobby Lobby" Tuesday

Story Of Chicago Orphan Who Rose From News Vendor To Fight Managing Will Be Program Feature

A dazzling array of guest hobbyists, headed by Mrs. Donald M. Nelson, wife of the Chairman of the War Production Board, will inaugurate the new series of Dave Elman's "Hobby Lobby" program, at 8:30 p. m. Tuesday over WABC. "Hobby Lobby" will be heard every Tuesday evening thereafter. Among the other interesting hobbyists will be Judy Canova, famous movie comedienne who collects hill-billy songs; an amazing 8-year-old girl drummer-xylophonist-singer; a man who performs Herculean tasks, and a noted radio official who collects the amusing "fluffs" of radio announcers.

The story of John "Stockings" Kelly, a Chicago orphan who rose from newspaper vending to fight managing and accumulated \$15,000 in the process will be featured on Are You a Missing Heir program Tuesday, 8 p. m. over WABC. Kelly, after making a name for himself in the lightweight field, became manager for such fighters as Terry McGovern, Paaky McFarland and Eddie McGorty. He died intestate in Chicago May 31, this year, leaving an estate of \$15,000. Rightful heirs are his cousins, named Hiller, believed to be living in Chicago at the present time.

Joe Baker, refrigerator workman and suspected murdered, will once again wage a desperate fight for his life when he is heard over WJZ in "Famous July Trials," Tuesday at 9 p. m.

Baker was brought to trial when a night watchman found Ed Bailey, proprietor of a flower shop murdered and the days' receipts missing. The "Flower Shop" murder pointed toward Baker as investigation established that Joe, supposed to be working in the shop at the time, could not prove his whereabouts

on the evening of the crime, and had been in possession of an unusual amount of money the next day. Among other damaging bits of evidence was the fact that the defendant's hammer had been the murder weapon.

With the comedian and top-notch radio actor John Brown in the leading role, "The Perfect Crime" drama on "Johnny Presents" goes wacky and proves an old Russian proverb Tuesday, at 8 p. m. over WEAF.

The drama, entitled "Mistaken Mayhem," will be all about a man who plans, with his golf-friend, to murder another chap but gets murdered himself. All of which agrees with the old Slav proverb: "He who digs a pit for another himself will fall in it."
