

Electrifying Developments In Murder Case To Be Told

"Famous Jury Trials" Schedules Exciting Case For
Regular Broadcast Via WJZ At 9 P. M.
On Tuesday

All the evidence pointed to suicide. Bedridden for years, it appeared that Mrs. Myra Sabin had ended it all with a bullet in her temple after leaving a note to explain her actions.

However, a sensation quickly followed when the dead woman's nurse charged the husband, James Sabin, with having murdered his wife in order to marry her attendant. He denied the charges vehemently, accusing his accuser of the crime.

Developments during the electrifying trial that followed will be re-enacted during the "Famous Jury Trials" broadcast Tuesday, at 9:00 p. m., over WJZ.

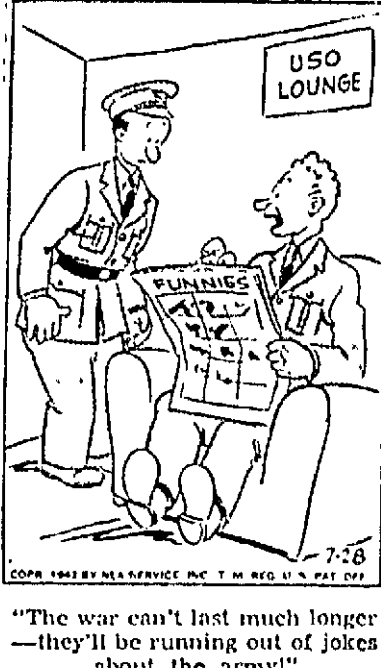
