

Goldman Will Present Five Soloists On Monday Program

Unusual Show Will Be Heard Via WJZ At 9 P. M.; "True Or False" Scheduled At Portsmouth Naval Training Center

Edwin Franko Goldman, whose band has become a welcome institution on the Mall of Central park in New York City, will conduct an unusual program on Monday, to be broadcast over WJZ from 9 to 9:30 p. m. It will feature five musicians, each to be given the spotlight as soloist on his particular instrument. They will be Del Staigers, cornet; Angel Del Bustó, bassoon; Victor Just, flute; David Karpilovsky, clarinet, and Raymond Crisara, cornet.

Returning to his customary presentation of varied selections on the Wednesday broadcast over WJZ from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m., Maestro Goldman will feature three of his own popular marches.

Taking over the naval training station's entertainment center at Portsmouth, N. H., at 8:30 p. m., EWT, "True or False," broadcasting over WJZ will give six enlisted men a chance to prove that man is the smarter as well as stronger of the sexes, pitting them against six young women in civilian employ.

"Alias John Freedom," the dramatic story of a modern Scarlet Pimpernel who works undercover to free the victims of Axis invaders, will be heard on WJZ beginning Monday. Previously aired Sunday afternoons, the show will be shifted to Monday at 10:15 p. m., and will remain in that spot thereafter.

Travelling secretly from one country of war-ridden Europe to another, John Freedom is the twentieth-century counterpart of the legendary Robin Hood and the 18th century adventurer. Each program in the series is the drama of an escape from the clutches of brutal oppressors.

Two popular operas provide the featured fare for Monday at 8:30 p. m. over WEA. Soprano Margaret Spinks sings the "Jewel Song" from "Faust" and the Firestone Symphony Orchestra has scheduled "Dance of the Comedians" from "The Bartered Bride."

Miss Spinks also sings Del Riego's "O, Dry Those Tears," "Thine Alone" from Victor Herbert's "Eileen," and Oscar Straus' "We Will Always Be Sweethearts," from the old Chevalier-MacDonald film, "One Hour with You." The orchestra completes the concert with the Czardas from Delibes' "Coppelia" and Lehar's "Gold and Silver" waltz. Alfred Wallenstein conducts.
