

Nation's Military Leaders To Be Heard On Air Sunday

General Eisenhower, Admiral Nimitz, Admiral Leahy And Elmer Davis Set On Army Program At 2 P. M. Via WABC

General Dwight Eisenhower and Admiral Chester W. Nimitz will be heard from far flung battlefronts during a broadcast on "The Production Crisis," Sunday, 2 to 2:30 p. m. over WABC.

Admiral William D. Leahy will make his first radio guest appearance since he was made chief of staff of the commander-in-chief of the Army and Navy. The broadcast will launch the Army-Navy Production Award program.

Elmer Davis, Director of the Office of War Information will bring to the public facts about the critical situation in war materiel, one of the toughest problems in the production program today.

Andre Kostelanetz and his orchestra play three Victor Herbert tunes as a highlight of "Pause That Refreshes" over WABC Sunday, at 4:30 p. m. The numbers are "When You're Away," "March of the Toys" and "Kiss Me Again." Other selections by Kostelanetz and the orchestra are "One Night of Love" and "Everything I Love." Rise Stevens, Metropolitan Opera mezzo soprano, is guest singer and Albert Spalding, violinist, is emcee.

The unbelievable horrors perpetrated by the Nazis on the helpless victims of war, will be dramatized on WPB's This Is Our Enemy series, Sunday, 10:00 p. m. WOR. Glenn Stadler, UP correspondent will give an eye witness account of concentration camp horrors having been interned by the Nazis for five months upon the United States' entry into the war. Stadler gained his freedom in the exchange of prisoners.

The entire ensemble dedicates the hymn of the evening, "Saved by Grace," to the officers and men of Camp Croft, S. C., who voted it their favorite.
