

Hot Legal Battle In Famous Murder Trial To Be Refought

Pneumatic Drill Will Cause Uproarious Consequences On Tommy Riggs And Betty Lou Spot

The hot legal battle once waged over Sam Rowe, accused murderer of Boxer Joey Taber, will be fought again when "Famous Jury Trials" presents the "Prize Ring Murder," Tuesday at 9 p. m. over WJZ.

When Joey Taber left the fight ring after his smashing victory over Waddell, he was on his way to the feather-weight championship. Two hours later, he lay dead in a gutter—"murdered," said the coroner's jury, "by persons unknown."

But witnesses were found who testified that, shortly before his death, Taber had beaten up Sam Rowe, local gambler, who had sworn vengeance.

Rowe's trial, the complete proceedings of which will be dramatized, produced startling new evidence which will give radio sleuths a deal of sifting.
