

c Festival to Go WGN at 8 Tonight

The 13th annual Chicago music festival, dedicated to the U. S. armed forces with a theme that "song will unify our nation," will be broadcast over WGN tonight at 8. A total of 10,000 musicians will take part in the festival.

The program will be launched with the premiere playing of "Victory," a march overture by Nathaniel Shilkret, by the festival symphony of 114 men under the direction of Henry Weber, general musical director for the festival.
