Musical Professor Gives First Airing To Song Inspired By Bravery Of Navy Chaplain At Pearl Harbor

"Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition," a new song inspired by the bravery of a Navy chaplain in the attack on Pearl Harbor, will have its first airing as an ensemble production number on Kay Kyser's "College of Musical Knowledge" Wednesday at 10 p. m. over WEA. The song is by Frank Loesser, whose "Jingle, Jangle, Jingle" is one of the current top hits.

As the legend goes, an unnamed chaplain and two assistants were on the afterdeck of a battleship that fateful Sunday morning of December 7, running up bunting and adjusting the rig in preparation for divine service. When the attack came, the chaplain dropped the hunting and manned an anti-aircraft gun.

"This is no time to be a politician," he said, "otherwise we'll all be in perdition." Saying which, he squeezed the trigger and the gun began to speak.

Presently they heard him shout: "Praise the Lord and pass the ammunition! I just got one of the . . . !"
