Thomas L. Thomas, rising young Metropolitan baritone, will be guest soloist on "Voice of Fire" with Alfred Wallenstein and the Firestone Orchestra at 8:30 p. m., over WEAJ.

The singer will offer "The World Is Mine" "Tumiri Song," "Song of the Vagabonds" from "The King," and the old Welsh folk song, "All Thru the Night." The orchestra is to feature the Scherzo from the Afro-American symphony of the distinguished contemporary Negro composer, William Grant Still; Strauss' "Where the Citrons Bloom" and G. Dance No. 2.

Thomas came to the States 20 years ago from native Wales. He has made Metropolitan Opera debut having appeared in several programs.
