

Radio Network To Portray Review Of Britain At War

Shortwave Story Scheduled For Tuesday Night;
Jury Trial Also Booked For
Airlanes

"This Nation at War", WJZ network series which reports the war activities of the people on the home front, will span the ocean by shortwave on Tuesday at 9:30 p. m., to hear the story of England at war.

Speaking from London, Robert S. John, noted commentator and writer, will offer a commentary on the England which has survived and surmounted three grueling years of war. He will emphasize how industry is functioning under war-time conditions. During his leisure hours, St. John works in a British munitions plant.

Narrator James Backus, directing the program from New York, will then shift the scene to the Army Air Force Combat Crew School at Smyrna, Tenn., where Lieut. Burgess Meredith, former radio, screen and stage actor, will broadcast from a giant, four-motor bomber plane as the facts are told of how ferry command pilots and crews are trained for their highly specialized and dangerous tasks.

Other sections to receive the spotlight will be the research laboratories of a Minneapolis Co. for a description of the ice indicator used to measure ice on plane wings, and the manner in which the de-icers operate, and finally, a pickup from Cleveland, O., for a review of the Westinghouse "Health for Victory" Clubs established in major industries throughout the country.

Mark Winthrop will be tried for the murder of his son when "Famous Jury Trials" brings a case of rural violence to its WJZ listeners, Tuesday, at 9 p. m.

Winthrop's 23-year-old son was found dead beside a creek on his father's farm. Investigation proved that the father had quarreled with his son the previous evening.

Winthrop's own housekeeper, as well as neighbors who disliked him, testified against him at the trial.

Nat Leslie, drummer for Meredith Willson, will be signally honored by the maestro on the Meredith Willson-John Nesbitt program 9:30 p. m. via WEAF where Willson features Leslie's "Sentimental Journal," from the archives of music, lost to the public for some reason or other. Willson will also play the Sousa march "Manhattan Beach." Connie Haines, the program's petite singer will sing the lyrics to the lost tune. John Nesbitt will present excerpts from Mein Kampf in a stirring challenge to the public, so that it may further heed the danger of Hitler.

Two heroes of the First World War will tell of their experiences and their present work when they are presented by Horace Heidt on the "Treasure Chest" broadcast over WABC Youngstown, O., at 8:30 p. m.

They are Maj. K. M. Haber, who saw action on four of the five major fronts in the last war and who is now executive officer representing the U. S. Army at the Ravenna, O., arsenal, and Joseph Rendinall, a Marine in the last war who is now a deputy in a Youngstown Court. Rendinall was awarded the Order of the Purple Heart and the Oak Cluster for heroic action in France.
