

James Melton Will Sing On Sunday Afternoon Program

Twelfth Appearance Scheduled By Tenor As Guest On Andre Kostelanetz Spot Over WABC

Making it an even dozen appearances as a guest singer on the Andre Kostelanetz "Pause That Refreshes" program, James Melton, tenor, will be on hand for the Sunday, airing over WABC at 4:30 p. m. Orchestral numbers conducted by Kostelanetz include "Carnival of Rio," waltz from Tschai-kowsky's "Sleeping Beauty" and Irving Berlin's "Be Careful, It's My Heart." Albert Spalding, violinist, is master of ceremonies.

Gladys Swarthout will sing a medley from the Rodgers and Hart success "By Jupiter" and the dramatic "Card Song" from Bizet's "Carmen" on the Sunday, "Family Hour" program featuring Deems Taylor and Al Goodman's orchestra at 5:00 p. m. over WABC.

Doris Fleeson, now Washington correspondent for a New York newspaper, who, with Sumner Welles on one of his missions abroad, visited German labor camps for women, will give an eye-witness account of conditions.
