

"Duffy's Tavern" Sets Grand Reopening For October 6

Comedy Skit To Share Honors With Fighting Marine And Famous Jury Trial Tuesday Night

Duffy's Tavern, the "poor man's Stork Club," with Ed Gardner in the starring role, returns to the air Tuesday, at 8:30 p. m. over WJZ.

"Duffy's Tavern" was hailed last season as one of the outstanding new program developments of the year. The comedy show is the creation of Ed Gardner, former radio producer and writer, who plays the role of Archie, the harassed counterman in Duffy's place—"where the elite meet to eat."

The scene of the entire series is the Tavern, where Archie holds forth as counterman and manager. The characters include Miss Duffy, the boss' daughter; Eddie, the waiter; Finnegan, a constant but not so bright customer, and others who patronize the joint in spite of Archie's insults. Most of the time the manager is trying to improve the tone of the Tavern in hopes of drawing the carriage trade.

Pvt. Francis Pline, U. S. Marines, a 1940 graduate of Father Edward Joseph Flanagan's famous Boys Town in Nebraska who has already seen considerable action in this war, is to be introduced on the air by Ginny Simms Tuesday at 8:00 p. m. over WJZ.

An accused cop-killer with a previous criminal record will be up before the Blue Network jury when the case of "The People Versus Mike Doran" takes to the air during "Famous Jury Trials," Tuesday at 9:00 p. m., EWT.

Mike Doran, an escaped convict, was captured suspiciously near the bodies of two recently murdered policemen. The law charged the fugitive with murder but, as Doran was unarmed when caught, the case was far from air-tight.

The defense proved that while Doran was being held at the local police station awaiting extradition for a previous crime, his jailers had allowed him to become a trusty and even a drinking companion.

Altho the original jury took three days to reach a decision the Blue web jury, despite sensational charges which will be batted back and forth, will reach their verdict during the broadcast.

Three Lima Youths Included In Newest Group To Go To Parris Island

Staff Sergt. Thomas B. Lunney of the local U. S. Marine Corps Recruiting station, announced officially Tuesday that 13 more Lima and area men have been enlisted in the Marines. The aspirants to the famed "Raiders" of the Marine Corps are: Raymond R. Rush, son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Rush, 555 S. Pine-st, and formerly an employe of The Lima News; Charles A. Fisher, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Fisher, 713 Broadway; Waldo D. Fetter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira D. Fetter, Route 2, all of Lima; Joseph E. Custer, Findlay; Eugene A. Freisthler, George H. Fisher, Jr., Richard H. Ash, Quentin B. Danzig, and Harold E. Money, all of Sidney; Isaac M. Gildow, Bellefontaine; Frank F. Sommer, Minster; Lloyd E. Binkley, Buckland; and Forest C. Wentz, of St. Johns.

All, had been previously accepted at the Lima Marine Station, and transferred to Headquarters, Cleveland, where they successfully passed the final examinations and were enlisted. The new Marine privates were then transferred to the training base, Marine barracks, Parris Island, S. C., for the regular six to eight week schedule of basic training. Upon completion of the basic training, they will be assigned to some duty of their choice in Marine land, sea, or air forces.
