

Paul Muni Cast In Major Role For Murder Of Lidice

Stage And Screen Performer Will Appear In Edna St. Vincent Millay's Epic Poem Monday Night

Paul Muni, stage and screen performer, will portray the principal role in the dramatic verse narrative, "The Murder of Lidice," by the Pulitzer-prize-winning poet, Edna St. Vincent Millay, Monday at 10:30 p. m. over WEAJ.

Written especially for radio at the request of the Writers' War Board, Miss Millay's epic poem tells of the razing of the village of Lidice, Czechoslovakia, by the Nazis, and contains an important message to all freedom-loving people throuth the world. The poem has been described by the Writers' War Board as "one of the finest pieces of true propaganda to come out of the war."
