On Saturday, Oct. 17, the House of Representatives voted to permit the induction of young men 19 and 18 years old into the Army.

Now I do not wish to criticize this piece of legislation for I believe that the induction of single men 18 and 19 years old is much better in general for the nation than the induction of married men with dependents but at the same time I do not believe that it is right that these men should be compelled to give their lives for their government and country and yet at the same time due to the fact that they are under the age limit of 21 years old are not permitted any representation in their government since they are unable to vote.

I believe that since these young men 18 and 19 years old are compelled to fight for their country that they should be permitted by legislation to vote and have equal representation in their government. For after all a young man 18 or 19 years old pays taxes directly or indirectly on everything they buy also by recent legislation they are classed as adults old enough to fight for their country. If these young men pay taxes and are compelled to fight then I believe that the legislatures should lower the age limit to the age of 18 years.
