

Duke Of Paducah To Honor Political Parties, Turkeys

Has Three Axes To Grind; Will Tell How Turkeys Are Thankful Because Of Meat Rationing; Gene Krupa Also Featured

Whitey Ford (the Duke of Paducah) has three axes to grind this Thanksgiving season, when he will celebrate for the Democrats, the Republicans and the turkeys. Whitey will tell how thankful the turkeys are that meat is being rationed when he is heard on "Plantation Party" Friday over WEAF at 9:30 p. m. (EWT.)

The Plantation Party choir and Basso Michael Stewart, the Doring Sisters and Louise Massey and the Westerners will all join in offering musical selections befitting the Thanksgiving holiday.

Gene Krupa and his orchestra will be featured over WJZ on the "Victory Parade of Spotlight Bands" Friday, at 9:30 p. m., EWT, from Los Angeles.

Krupa, known as the "Ace Drummer Man," got his start playing drum when he was 13 years old and while still a youngster joined Benny Goodman and became the outstanding drummer in the country. He stayed with Goodman several years and then

branched out and started his own orchestra. He was a success overnight.
