

Churchill's Broadcast at 3 p.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill will make a worldwide radio broadcast at 3 p. m. today, with WIBA carrying his address in this area.

Churchill will make his talk on the eve of his 68th birthday anniversary. While the subject has not been announced, it was believed he would discuss the general war outlook. Churchill made his last radio address May 10, the second anniversary of the German invasion of Holland and Belgium and of his ascendancy to the prime minister's post.
