The will was subject to the death of her husband, after which bequeaths to a sister-in-law, Ada Elliott, and nieces of her husband, Gertrude Fisher and Alethia Bonnoront of \$1,500 each were made. A sister, Mrs. T. E. Reed and the following nieces and nephews, Frances Schrolucke, Zella Eversman, and Walter Fledderjohann, were each awarded \$500, as were Ralph Sneathkamp and Lois Kordes.

After payments of all bills and bequests, the remainder of the estate is to be divided with one-half going to Ada Elliott, Gertrude Fisher and Alethia Bonnoront, share and share alike, and the other half to Sophia Reed, Frances Schrolucke, Zella Eversman, Ralph Sneathkamp, Walter Fledderjohann and Lois Kordes, share and share alike.

Earl Kent, Milo Smith and Walter Bauer were named appraisers. Paul O. Boesel was appointed administrator under \$20,000 bond. The will was dated Feb. 9, 1937, and was witnessed by Marjorie Green, I. W. Green, and Aimee Green, all of Lima.
