## CONFER ON BABY WITH STOMACH ON WRONG SIDE

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 21.—One year-old David Schmidt has started out life sideways, and Louisville doctors are holding almost daily conferences to determine if an operation will enable the youngster to grow up with normal eating habits.

David, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schmidt, was born with his stomach and descending colon on the right side instead of the left. Altho David is a little over a year old, the side twist to his stomach has resulted in his gaining only 13 ounces over his birth weight of 11 pounds and 14 ounces.

At present, he is being fed thru a tube. Dr. Edwin P. Scott believes that David can live with his stomach on the wrong side, but that he cannot gain weight normally since the normal passage of food is blocked. The baby has only attained the growth of a seven months old child and cannot talk.

## RELIEF WORKER HELD BY NAZIS

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The American Friends society reported today Burritt Hiatt of Wilmington, O., has been transferred to Baden-Baden, Germany, from Lourdes, France, where he had been awaiting evacuation with a diplomatic group. Hiatt headed American Friends relief work in France.

The society said Hiatt, classed as a diplomat and not as a prisoner of war by the Nazis when they took over unoccupied France,
