## "Victory Parade Of Spotlight Bands" To Emanate From Toledo Army Training Center Monday

Lawrence Tibbett, one of the prominent operatic singers listed in the recent Radio Editors' poll as a leading favorite for the year of 1942, is to appear for the fourth time on the "Great Artist Series" next Monday, from 9 to 9:30 p. m. over WEAF.

Johnny Long and his orchestra will be featured on the "Victory Parade of Spotlight Bands" over WJZ Monday at 9:30 p. m. from the U. S. Army Training center in Toledo.

Joan Blondell, Alan Ladd and Land Cregar are brought to the radio theatre of Cecil B. DeMille's adaptation of the gripping screen drama "This Gun for Hire." The broadcast will be heard Monday at 9 p. m. over WABC.

Two exclusive talks by important U. S. government officials will be broadcast over WEAF Monday from 10:30 to 11 p. m. Under Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson will be heard during the first half of the period and Dr. Charles Thomson, chief of the division of cultural relations of the department of state, will be heard during the latter half.

"A Woman of America," new serial based on the covered wagon days immediately after the Civil War, makes its bow Monday over WEAF at 10:30 to 11 a. m. with Anne Seymour, popular radio actress, in the leading role. The series will be heard daily, Mondays thru Fridays.

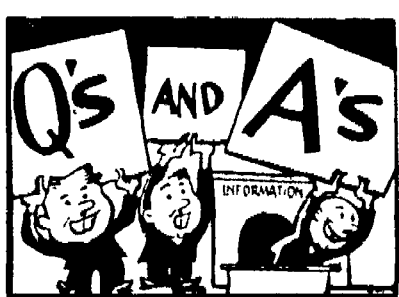
