

Roosevelt Will Broadcast Address to Nation Tonight

Pres. Roosevelt will speak to the nation by radio at 8:30 tonight, and WIBA will carry the address, his first since the conference at Casablanca with Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

Because of this event, Truax Field Calling will be broadcast at 9:30 instead of its usual 8:30. Virginia Quick, daughter of Mrs. Robert Quick, 2318 Rowley ave., will be presented as "Truax Girl of the Week." She is a University of Wisconsin graduate, and her father was a major in World War I.

In observance of Lincoln day, WIBA will present an address by Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota at 11 p. m. The program also will include Basil Rathbone's reading of the Gettysburg address.

A second GOP leader, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, will speak at 9 over WGN, and Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr. (R—Mass.) will talk at 9:30 on WMAQ.
