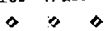

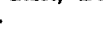

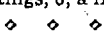

Bolivian Admits 'Patio Murders'

LA PAZ, Bolivia—(U.P.) —Police said Saturday that Luis Anacleto Montano, 29-year-old Bolivian medical student, has confessed to the "patio murders," admitting that he killed his mother, his mistress, and the latter's daughter in Cordoba, Argentina. Montano, police said, dismembered their bodies with a butcher knife and buried them under the tiles of the patio in their home.
