

Roosevelt to Launch Drive for Red Cross at 3:15 p. m.

Pres. Roosevelt will speak at 3:15 p. m. today over WIBA, launching the American Red Cross drive to raise \$125,000,000. Gen. Dwight B. Eisenhower, commander of Allied forces in North Africa, and Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, commander of the U. S. Pacific fleet, may add their appeals for funds. Norman H. Davis will introduce the speakers.

OPA RULES ON DIAPERS

RENO, Nev. — (U.P.) — OPA representative Dr. Rex Arlo Crider has ruled to give babies a break in the matter of diapers. His ruling is that in "rented baby pants," the baby is entitled to a reasonable fling in them without its parents being penalized. The laundries, who are entitled to exact a deposit on them, are not permitted, he holds, to make deductions for "reasonable wear and tear," when the rented diapers are returned, nor can they exact a deposit higher than the ceiling price for diapers rented.

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
