## 'Who' Was Who, New Reference Published

CHICAGO—(U.P.)—Like the hoot of a wise old owl, "Who's Who" has echoed from library shelves for years. Now a new tune has been added—"Who Was Who."

Officials of A. N. Marquis Co., Chicago, have announced publication of a new reference book, "Who Was Who," containing biographies of dead persons listed in "Who's Who" from its founding in 1897 to 1942.

The increase in volumes devoted to the war, officials explained, has placed a premium on library space. They said cost experts estimate the expense of maintaining one foot of shelving in a public library at between \$1 and \$2 a year.

"Who Was Who" saves more than six feet of shelving, they said, because it contains listings of dead persons included in 22 volumes of "Who's Who."
