Truax Post Band to Play in First of Program Series

The Truax post band and Col. Fay O. Dice, chief of instruction at the huge army field outside Madison will be heard over WHA, Madison, and nine other Wisconsin radio stations Saturday at 3:15 p. m. The program will be the first of a weekly series arranged by Col. Dice and originating in the studios of WHA, University of Wisconsin station.

The 15-minute programs will deal with the lives of the men at Truax Field, and in addition will bring to the radio audience of the state many soldiers who are musical artists. Every other week the body of the program will be devoted to dramatizations of incidents at the field, in the lives of the men stationed there, or of graduates who have already taken their places in the front lines of actual warfare, according to Ben Park, WHA production manager.

The human interest dramas will be written by Mrs. Romance Koopman, script writer at the university station, and acted by the WHA players. Alternate broad-
