

Marlene Dietrich Will Show Defense Tactics on Radio

Marlene Dietrich, screen star, will give a demonstration of new defense tactics on Eddie Cantor's "Time to Smile" program at 8 tonight over WIBA. Before an audience of 3,000 army men at Pasadena, Calif., La Dietrich will show Eddie she can wield her long-stemmed cigaret holder as effectively as a soldier uses a bayonet.

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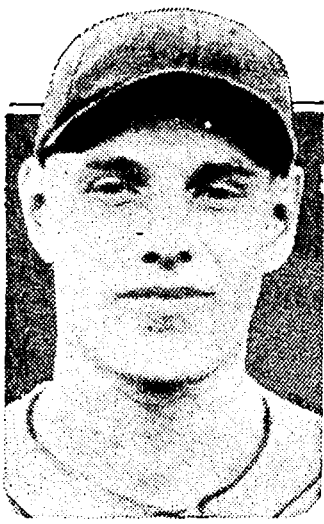
