

Gladys Swarthout To Sing "Maryland, My Maryland"

Bert Lytell To Emcee "The Entertainment World's
Dedication To A Cause" Over
WOR On Sunday

Gladys Swarthout, lovely star of radio, concert and opera, will be heard in selections from the popular operetta, "Maryland! My Maryland!" on the Sunday broadcast of "The Family Hour" over WABC at 5 p. m. (EWT). Also on Miss Swarthout's program is "In the Silence of the Night" which will be included in tribute to its composer, Sergei Rachmaninoff, the noted pianist, conductor and composer who died this week at his home in California.

Bert Lytell, master of ceremonies on the "Stage Door Canteen" programs over WABC Thursday nights, has been given a signal honor. He has been assigned as an emcee of the program which will mark radio's own salute to the performers who have been devoting their efforts toward winning the war. Title of the airing is "The Entertainment World's Dedication to a Cause" and it will be heard over WOR Sunday, at 3:30 p. m. EWT.

Blood will flow freely, echoes of doom will fill the airwaves and the Inner Sanctum Ghost society will be enriched by at least one new member when Lon Chaney, Jr., son of one of Hollywood's greatest character actors, the late Lou Chaney, enacts a gripping killer-diller role on "Inner Sanctum Mystery" over WJZ Sunday (8:30 p. m., EWT). the half-hour over WEAJ at 8 p. m. (EWT).

The "Radio Reader's Digest" features three members of its "stock company" spotlighting James Monks, Stefan Schnabel and Berry Kroeger in the dramatic portions of the broadcast on Sunday, at 9 p. m., EWT, over WABC.

The vital question of "What Kind of an America Are We Fighting For?" will be explored by two learned women, Dr. Eveline M. Burns and Rose Wilder Lane, during the "Wake Up America!" forum broadcast over WJZ Sunday, from 5:15 to 5:45 p. m., EWT.

Broadcasting from the stage of the Adams theatre in Newark, N. J., Phil Spitalny and the all-girl orchestra of the "Hour of Charm" present half an hour of the music by Jerome Kern, on Sunday, at 10 p. m. EWT, over WEAJ.

The bombing of Bataan and the heroic work of the U. S. Army nurses who served at Base Hospital 1, will be commemorated in the drama entitled, "The Rock," to be heard on "The Man Behind the Gun," Sunday at 10:30 p. m. (EWT) over WABC.

The story of radio station KDKA, Pittsburgh, the birth of modern radio broadcasting, will be recounted by John Nesbitt on the program with John Charles Thomas, baritone, over WEAJ Sunday, at 2:30 p. m. EWT.
