Sixth War Forces Delaware Town to Number Houses

LEWES, Del. — (U.P.) — Homes in this seashore community which have remained without street numbers through five previous wars will be numbered from now on, according to David Montcalm, U. S. postman.

"Ever since 1631 and up until this war broke out," Montcalm said, "it was an easy job to deliver mail here. The postman knew everybody and his grandfather, but times have changed."

Montcalm said that an influx of war workers and an increased garrison at near-by Fort Miles brought floods of letters addressed to persons he had never heard of, which gave him the job of hunting around town to locate the new families.

Consequently, Montcalm began to number homes throughout Lewes. He purchased white pine boards and spends his evenings painting numbers on them. He delivers them to the town's residents with the admonition to inform their correspondents of their street numbers.

Juries Not Toys, Conway Declares

Vaughn S. Conway, Baraboo, candidate for circuit judge, declared in a radio speech Saturday that "juries should not be the mere playthings of judges."

"The ends of justice require that the verdicts of juries be accorded that respect and vitality which the Constitution intended they should have," he said. "I here and now respectfully challenge the power of judges to set aside the verdicts of juries."
