Gov. Cordell Hull, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, will discuss "The Security of War Information" as guest speaker on "Mr. District Attorney" Wednesday at 9.30 p. m. (EWT) over WEAJ. 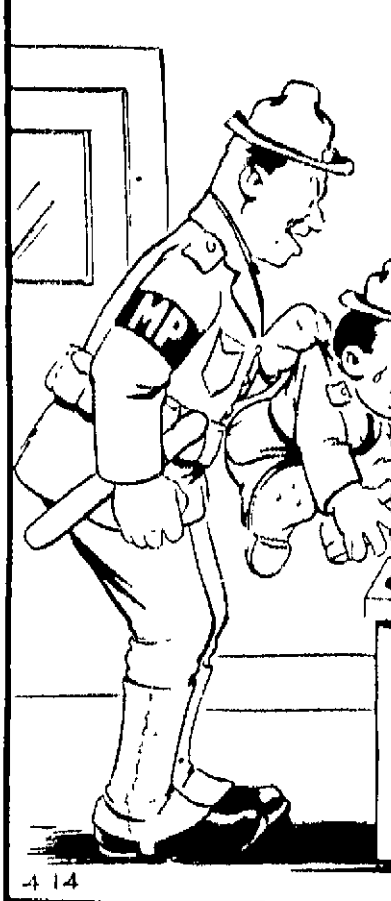

MOTORISTS ARE URGED TO CARE FOR '42 PLATES

COLUMBUS, O., April 14 — (INS) — Ohio motorists were cautioned today by State Highway Director Hal G. Sours to take "extra care" of their 1942 license plates.

Sours said reports had come to the highway department that the bronze plates are deteriorating and that the paint is wearing off and the metal itself is corroding.

"Those plates," said Sours, "were intended only for one year's use. When they were made there was no steel shortage. Now it is possible the plates will have to last not only thru 1943 but perhaps thru 1944 or longer."

Sours suggested that motorists keep their license plates free from grit and road dirt and apply a heavy coat of ordinary wax.
