## Last Broadcasts Set for May 19, 21

One of the foremost chamber music quartets in the world, the Pro Arte quartet which has played before all the crowned heads of Europe and at the White House, will broadcast two final concerts of the season at the conclusion of their third year in residence on the University of Wisconsin campus.

They will be heard Wednesday and Friday, May 19 and 21, at 6 p. m. over WHA, the state station on the university campus. The concerts were announced today by Prof. Carl Bricken, director of the university school of music, and Walter Krulvitch, state station program supervisor.

Antonio Brosa, first violin and director of the quartet, has announced that they will play a Hadyn quartet in G, minor as the major work of the Wednesday half-hour radio concert, concluding with the "Andante Cantabile" from Tschaiakowsky's "Quartet in D." On Friday the principal work will be Borodin's "Quartet No. Two in D Major," with a serenade by Hadyn as the concluding piece.

The concerts will be broadcast from Music hall on the campus, where the quartet has played each Thursday at 3:30 p. m. illustrating Prof. Bricken's course on the quartets of Hadyn and Mozart and quartets of Mozart and Beethoven, during the two semesters.

Members of the quartet have been heard in many concerts, as individuals or as a group, and have made numerous concert tours to other states.

## War Not Yet Won, President Warns

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Pres. Roosevelt Saturday night warned the nation that the war has not yet been won and "we must not withhold any human effort in fighting it."

His warning voiced in a letter to James M. Landis, director of the Office of Civilian Defense, calling attention to the approaching second anniversary of that agency. The OCD was established on May 20, 1941.

The president saluted some 12,000,000 women and men civilian defense volunteers for their efforts in protecting the nation's home bulwarks. He added that "those efforts must continue unceasing until the day of victory is attained."

## New Motored Glider Passes Initial Tests

MINNEAPOLIS — (U.P.) — Army officials are testing a huge two motored transport glider, built almost entirely of non-essential materials, that is expected to expand the use of gliders in warfare.

The nation's first trial flight of this type of aircraft was made Wednesday at Wold Chamberlain airport where the troop-carrying gliders are being assembled on a volume basis.

Col. Fred R. Dent, Wright field, O., head of the army glider program, piloted the craft with four other officers and ballast aboard. Towed to 2,000 feet altitude by a bomber, he cast off the towline and climbed to 3,500 feet.

Bringing it in for a smooth landing, he taxied to the end of the field and took off under the glider's own power. At 800 feet, Col. Dent turned about and landed.

The power glider was conceived by John E. Parker, president of Northwestern Aeronautical Corp., Minneapolis, which is the largest of 15 producers of the craft.

The glider, which in Thursday's flights carried a full complement of 15 equipped troops, was likened to the women's auxiliaries of the armed forces. It would release war planes, used for towing purposes, to the fighting fronts.
