hold any human effort in fighting His warning voiced in a letter to James M. Landis, director of the Office of Civilian Defense, calling' attention to the approaching second anniversary of that agency.
The OCD was established on May 20, 1941.
The president saluted some 12,-000,000 women and men civilian defense volunteers for their efforts
