Joe E. Brown, famous film comedian who toured South Pacific Army and Navy camps entirely by air to entertain service men, is due to tell all about his trip when he appears in the "Ceiling Unlimited" drama shown on Station WABC at 7:15 p. m. (EWT) Monday in "I Saw War."
