Swiss Warning Believed Aimed at Axis Nations

LONDON — (U.P.) — Possibility that the Axis might violate Switzerland's centuries - old neutrality in a desperate move to speed up Italo-German communications when the Allies invade Europe was advanced by London observers Saturday as the inspiration for the blunt "hands - off" warning issued by the Swiss a few days ago.

Gen. Henri Guisan, commander of the small but tough Swiss army, broadcast an unexpected warning to the world to "keep hands off our passes."

The Swiss military chief did not specify the nation or nations to which his warning was addressed, but Switzerland is surrounded by Axis countries — Italy, Germany, and occupied France, and her two great mountain passes, St. Gotthard and Simplon, are easily accessible to Italy.

Virtually every road leading into Switzerland is mined, every hillside is fortified with hidden blockhouses, machine gun nests and pillboxes. Long concrete "Chinese walls" stretch for miles along the borders.

While the Swiss standing army is small, almost every male between 20 and 52 years of age is assigned to a small area, usually near his home, for which he is responsible.

WIBA to Go on Air at 6 a. m. Daily Starting Monday

Beginning Monday, station WIBA will go on the air at 6 a. m. with a program of variety music, Kenneth Schmidt, program director for WIBA, announced today.

The opening of WIBA airplanes a half-hour earlier than has been the custom marks the first time in the station's history that starting hour has been scheduled for 6 a. m., although the station, on special occasions, has opened earlier.

The program will be entitled the "Morning Parade" and will range from popular music to semi-classical in composition. At 6:25, a five minute news broadcast will be heard.

The new time will be in effect Monday through Saturday, with Sunday's starting time set as usual at 7.

'Uncle Sam' Show on WIBA to Tell African War Epic

A war epic of North Africa, "How Food Helps Fight the Axis," makes dramatic fare on the "Uncle Sam" program series this week on WIBA every morning, Monday through Friday, at 9:30.

The story tells of three hungry doughboys stranded on a desert who are greatly surprised when food instead of an expected enemy bomb drops to them out of the clouds. This program is scheduled for Thursday.

Other "Uncle Sam" programs include a dramatization describing how a bomber goes to "Tommy" somewhere on the fighting front from "Presentees" on the B-24 production front (Friday); the tale of "Larrabee," a blind man, who is awarded a medal for efficient war work (Wednesday); the importance of sharing our food supplies as illustrated by the experience of "Comrade Officer Pushkin," of the Russian army (Monday); and the eye-witness story of "Joe Martin," radio man, merchant seaman, who tells of the torpedoing of the S. S. Tadousac, one of the team of United Nations ships that landed troops, food, and equipment in North Africa, and stunned the Axis (Tuesday).
