cessible to Italy.

Virtually every road leading into Switzerland is mined, every hillside is fortified with hidden blockhouses, machine gun nests and pillboxes. Long concrete "Chinese walls" stretch for miles along the borders.

While the Swiss standing army is small, almost every male between 20 and 52 years of age is assigned to a small area, usually near his home, for which he is responsible.
