miere the U. S. Army Tank Corps' new marching song, "Men of Iron," as the highlight of their broadcast on Sunday, at 2:30 p. m., over Station WEAF. The song was written by W. R. Mason of the utilities company which sponsors the series, after he had spent four weeks filming maneuvers and tests at Ft. Knox, Ky.

"The Smiling Killer," sanguinary saga of a pretty night club singer who goes berserk over a song and commits a series of macabre murders, will be the "Inner Sanctum Mystery" offering, Sunday at 8:30 p. m., EWT, over WJZ.

Topics on the agenda of the approaching annual Conference of Governors will be explored by four of the state executives in a special WEAF broadcast Sunday with their discussions followed immediately by a critical "University of Chicago Roundtable" survey of the governors' ideas on the post-war roles of the states. The program will be, in reality, a double broadcast beginning at 1:30 p. m. (EWT), with a special pickup from Columbus, where the Governors conference is being held.

A variety program highlighting Haydn's "Symphony No. 94" ("Surprise") and including five shorter works will be presented on the first of Arturo Toscanini's special War Bond concerts with the Summer Symphony orchestra Sunday (WEAF, 5 p. m., EWT).

Three noted speakers will appear on "Wake Up, America" on Sunday, at 3:15 p. m., EWT, over WJZ speaking on the topic "Can We Head off Serious Inflation?" They will be Congressman Albert A. Gore of Tennessee; Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, and Dr. O. Glenn Saxon, president of the Pennsylvania Economy League.

Mezzo soprano Gladys Swarthout makes this Sunday's broadcast a real family gathering by singing portions of "Fandango" by the "Family Hour's" own narrator, Deems Taylor. This traditional Basque song is from Taylor's latest opera "Ramuntcho" which had its debut in Philadelphia last season (WEAF, 5 p. m., EWT).

"In Memory of a Hero," a play based on a statement submitted especially for the series by Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes, will be the "Free World Theatre" offering to be presented over WJZ Sunday at 6:30 p. m., EWT. Charles Coburn, the motion picture star, will play the leading role.

The smoothly running married life of Kathy and Leslie Foster meets its first obstacle in a heated argument on "Those We Love," Sunday at 7 p. m., EWT, over WEAF.

The dramatic story of a scramble for strategic materials by the world powers after war struck will be told on "Unlimited Horizons" Sunday (WEAF, 11:30 p. m., EWT).
