

The Original "Rhythm Boys" To Appear With Whiteman

Bing Crosby And Fellow Singers Celebrate Reunion
On Orchestra Leader's Program At 8 P.

M. Sunday Over WEAF

"The Rhythm Boys," the trio that rose to fame with Paul Whiteman's band over a decade ago, will be reunited on "Paul Whiteman Presents" Sunday. The trio consists of Al Rinker, Harry Barris and a fellow who calls himself "The Groaner"—Bing Crosby. Starring Dinah Shore, the

program will be heard over WEAF at 8 p. m. (EWT).

"The Rhythm Boys" plan to sing such numbers as "Mississippi Mud" which they featured with the Whiteman orchestra around 1930.
