

Independence Day Programs Featured on Broadcasts Today

Three programs today will be devoted to the Independence day theme, and many other broadcasts will feature the patriotic motif in music and discussions.

Wendell L. Willkie will give a message to the freedom-loving nations of the world and Frederic March will appear in a drama reflecting America's early fight for liberty in a special broadcast at 1 p. m. over WBBM.

A special Fourth of July report to the nation on the Army hour, at 2:30 over WIBA, will pick up talks by commanding generals and troops on many fighting fronts. Chungking, Australia, Alaska, Panama, Iceland, Algiers, the Straits of Dover and the European theater of war will be contacted during the program.
