"Playwright" Judy Foster will entertain the Parent-Teachers-assisn Festival with the inside story of Dad's first romances on "A Date with Judy" Wednesday at 9 p. m., EWT, over WEA. JOB RELATIONS TO BE STUDIED

Industrial Supervisors Will Take Training Program Under WMC

The skill of understanding and handling people as a method of increasing production of essential war materials will be taught to a group of 10 industrial supervisors when a course in "Job Relations Training" is launched in Lima in the near future.

Job relations is the third subject to be thus taught by the Training Within Industry service of the War Manpower Commission. Nearly two years ago a similar course in Job Instructor Training was presented here, and later a course in Job Methods.

A "pre-view" meeting will be held at 8 p. m. Thursday, July 29, in the Y. M. C. A. to which industrial executives and members of the Personnel Managers-assisn have been invited. The Association of Commerce is co-operating in organizing the course.

Basic principles which are foundations in establishing and maintaining good relations in a shop or factory are: (1) Let each worker know how he is getting along; (2) give credit when due; (3) tell people in advance about changes that will affect them; and (4) make best use of each person's ability.

In handling a particular job relations problem, the course emphasizes that the supervisor must get the facts and be sure to have the whole story; weigh and decide . . . don't jump to con-
